here can be few better reasons for choosing a car than fulfilling a childhood dream, and for company director Jesús Fernández-Salguero, the mighty G-Wagen was just the car for the job.

Born and brought up in Spain, Jesús was no stranger to the Stuttgart marque. "My father always had them," he recalls. "He used to say 'Mercedes is Mercedes, and then there's the rest." He remembers being at secondary school when the G-Wagen was launched, and being impressed by its engineering. Since then he knew that one day he'd own one.

"I always fancied one but there's no point when you live in a city like Madrid or London," says Jesús. "They're too big, too bad with fuel and not politically correct, you wouldn't use it enough." However when he moved from Madrid to a more rural location he seized the opportunity. "I knew this was the time for me to buy one," he says.

His first G was a 12-year-old 300GD. He loved it so much that when his company moved him from Spain to Surrey in 1998 he couldn't bear to leave it behind. After a few years this was joined by another, newer 300GD. He couldn't resist the chance to get a left-hand-drive G-Wagen ready for his return to Spain.

"The trouble was this left us with two near-identical cars," recounts Jesús, "so unfortunately we had to sell the old car, even though my wife Maria preferred the older, scruffier one." With a big smile Maria agrees. "The other one was literally like a tractor," she says. "But I've got electric windows now!"

They've got a C180 Estate for ferrying their three children about in, but it's clear the G is the family favourite. "My wife loves it," says Jesús. "We have to fight for the car. We've always liked how they drive and their presence on the road." But what he really values is the car's off-road capabilities. But for Jesús this car has achieved more than off-roading prowess, it's been a social lifeline. "It's hard when you move countries and you don't have any friends," he says. "I heard about the G-Wagen Owner's Association on the internet [www.gwoa.co.uk], and within two months of landing here I was elected as a committee member. Finding a club and being made welcome was a good opportunity to make friends." He's now the club's Regional Southern Representative and has enjoyed going offroad on club events. "We sometimes end up pulling the Land Rovers out!" he jokes.

With a five-speed 'box, permanent fourwheel-drive and high and low ratio transfers, its clear that the G's ready to tackle anything Jesús throws at it, and he's certainly not precious about his pride and joy, which
